



Urban October 2020: A Summary

Urban October in numbers

Over 750 events | In 70 countries | In over 200 cities

he huge number and wide range of events organized during Urban October demonstrated that, far from being deterred by the COVID-19 pandemic, governments at all levels, NGOs, community organizations, academic institutions and many others were determined to find innovative ways to celebrate our cities and towns.

The month opened with World Habitat Day on 5 October with around 65 events being celebrated globally, in 41 countries and 55 cities.

The key event known as the Global Observance, hosted by UN-Habitat and Indonesia, featured video messages from the UN Secretary-General, the President of Indonesia and the UN Special Rapporteur on the right to adequate housing. There were live links to celebrations in Cameroon, Malaysia, and our Egypt office. Over 4,800 people took part either in person or followed the live feed.

From Pakistan to Palestine, from Myanmar to Yemen, from Cameroon to Ethiopia, MOUs were signed, online events were held, national strategies were launched, projects were initiated, and innovative ways were found to replace cancelled physical events.

Fast-forward 26 days and hundreds of people connected online to attend the Global Observance of World Cities Day which took place for the first time in Africa. The hybrid event included a video speech by the Kenyan president and other video messages from the UN Secretary-General and the African Union. The World Cities Report 2020 on the Value of Sustainable Urbanization launched on the same day.

Campaigns



The **#Housing4All** Campaign picked up speed since its launch on World Habitat Day. The Campaign features the

movie The Human Shelter which has been watched over 10,000 times on our corporate YouTube channel.



The **40 Days Safer Cities Challenge** has featured dozens of events organized by more than 30 organizations.
The campaign has circulated

widely on social media promoting urban safety innovations. It ended on World Cities Day with a learning event on safety and crime prevention actions.

Zoom in on the Office in Spain

Urban October celebrations in our Spain Office started on World Habitat Day. The Office and the Andalusian Agency of International Cooperation for Development jointly organized Housing for all: a perspective from international cooperation, an open virtual discussion with the participation of experts from UN-Habitat, the Andalusian Ministry of Development, Infrastructure and Land Management, the Andalusian Fund of Municipalities for International Solidarity, and experts from civil society. Discussion addressed the role of housing as a catalyst for progressive delivery of human rights and a basis for well-being, from the perspective of international cooperation.

To celebrate World Metropolitan Day the Office organized a discussion on Metropolitan Regions and the framework for recovery in collaboration with the Regional Government of the Basque Country and the Network of European Metropolitan Regions and Areas. The virtual event was held on 7 October with the participation of experts from global institutions and governments. It focused on initiatives being undertaken at metropolitan level to accelerate positive transformation of urban and territorial realities, in the context of the global pandemic.

From 26-28 October, the Office organized an Expert Group Meeting on Global Urban Safety Indicators and Monitoring Tool in partnership with the Madrid City Council. Over forty urban safety experts from around the world gathered to lay the groundwork for development of a global urban safety monitoring tool which will rely on data and evidence to strengthen policy and practice. Outcomes of the meeting have set the future course of the project as part of the 2020s Decade of Action Campaign.

The Urban Circuit

Post-COVID-19 Cities: Dialogues between Brazil and Lusophone Africa

To promote debate on the Urban October themes, the UN-Habitat Office in Brazil created the Urban Circuit in 2018. The initiative aims to support, promote and raise the visibility of events organized by a wide range of stakeholders during the month of October. Due to the pandemic, the third edition of the Urban Circuit went fully virtual in 2020, with live or recorded online events.

This online modality has been a unique opportunity to deepen the exchange of urban experiences and knowledge with other countries where UN-Habitat is also active. The 2020 Urban Circuit was held in partnership with UN-Habitat offices in Lusophone African countries (Angola, Cape Verde, Guinea-Bissau, Mozambique, and São Tomé and Príncipe). The main theme was Post-COVID-19 Cities: Dialogues between Brazil and Lusophone Africa, while the sub-themes aligned with those of World Habitat Day and World Cities Day.


Moving the initiative online allowed for an exchange between people from various countries, while outreach was virtually unlimited. The Urban Circuit was host to 186 events, with more than 1,000 speakers from the six participating countries, in addition to those from 18 other countries. The Urban Circuit YouTube Channel registered over 49,000 views so far.

In addition to UN-Habitat personnel, 60 volunteers with specific skills in communication, social media, video editing, graphic design, translation, and broadcasting were selected to participate in the Urban Circuit. All their work is on the virtual Arts Gallery of the Urban Circuit website.



Key events available on the Urban Circuit channel on YouTube include:

- The opening ceremony on 1 October to promote global sustainable urban development agendas (New Urban Agenda and 2030 Agenda) and the work of UN-Habitat in participating countries, especially during COVID-19. The event was attended by regional representatives for Latin America and the Caribbean and for Africa, as well as representatives of UN-Habitat offices in Angola, Brazil, Cape Verde, Guinea-Bissau, Mozambique and São Tomé & Príncipe. The UN-Habitat Executive Director participated via a recorded video message.
- World Habitat Day on 5 October to present the housing scenario in the developing Lusophone world, its main challenges, and concepts on inclusive, accessible, and adequate housing.
- Urban Fridays which shared UN-Habitat's methodologies on mapping, data production, urban resilience, urban policy and financing, spatial development frameworks, and Development Plans for 2030.
- World Cities Day on 31 October to exchange experiences and perspectives on innovative, active and strategic approaches by local communities for post-COVID-19 resilience and recovery. Speakers shared their experiences on the importance of local action in the design of more innovative, inclusive and sustainable cities, taking into account economic, social, and environmental factors.
- The closing ceremony on 3 November to share the thought process behind the initiative as well as best moments and lessons learnt



From roundtables and seminars to slam poetry, meditation, and the cleaning up of cities championship, this online edition of the Urban Circuit delivered on its promises. The themes covered were more diverse, with public spaces, urban planning, public security, gender, LGBTQIA+, racism, education, the environment, climate change, the 2030 Agenda, the SDGs, and especially housing and the importance of local actors and communities being tackled.

The Urban Circuit 2020 has shown that Brazil and Lusophone countries and cities in Africa share not only a common language, but also many challenges and potential solutions. The exchange between experts and actors from these countries has paved the way for a wider South-South cooperation platform with UN-Habitat.

Updates from our office in New York



Celebrations for Urban October in New York started on World Habitat Day. The UN-Habitat New York Office, along with the Consortium for Sustainable Urbanization and in collaboration with the American Institute of Architects New York Chapter hosted the event **Post Pandemic Cities Planning for the next 2.5 Billion Residents.**

The event highlighted that pandemics have historically played a unique role in shaping cities and COVID-19 presents us with a unique opportunity to reimagine the way cities are designed and planned. Planning and design have a critical role to play in ensuring that cities not only have the capacity to absorb an influx of people but also the ability to integrate newcomers as productive members of society.



Further recognizing the importance of urban innovation, the event Mobilizing Urban Stakeholders to accelerate progress towards the SDGs by 2030 used award-winning documentaries as unique mediums to inspire individuals to take action in their neighbourhoods in megacities worldwide and contribute towards achieving the SDGs and the 2030 Agenda. The panel discussion marked the first collaboration project between the MegaCities-ShortDocs festival and the Office in New York. The event fostered a partnership for future events with UN-Habitat and opportunities to showcase short documentaries on the UN-Habitat YouTube Channel throughout the duration of Urban October.

The month concluded with **World Cities Day**. To celebrate, the New York Office hosted a virtual World Cities Day event on 30 October. **Local Innovations, SDGs & COVID-19**

highlighted the interactions between local innovations and the Sustainable Development Goals, and how COVID-19 has changed the sustainable development strategies of communities and organizations. The event featured welcoming remarks from UN Secretary-General António Guterres as well as our Executive Director.



The same day, the Permanent Mission of Slovakia, the Permanent Mission of Germany to the UN, NGO Committee on Sustainable Development-NY, and UN-Habitat collaborated on the event **Better City, Better Life: Valuing our Communities & Cities** to highlight UN75 and World Cities Day. The event addressed the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on our communities and cities while strengthening our resilience to build back better. It emphasized that while many are utilizing innovative communication platforms that allow for better engagement to strengthen the resilience of their communities and cities, others without access are falling further behind.

It is important that we continue our focus on the SDGs and the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development to build partnerships between Member States, UN-Habitat, national and local authorities as well as stakeholders from civil society and the private sector. This will enable us to be better prepared to achieve the inclusive, safe, resilient and healthier future we want with the UN we need — to Leave No One Behind

Bolivia launches its Cities Policy to promote sustainable urban development

Bolivia presented its national urban policy, called the Cities Policy, on 7 October 2020. This strategic instrument will guide the sustainable development of its cities and territories and the country as a whole.

The Ministry of Public Works, Services and Housing, together with UN-Habitat Bolivia and with the cooperation of Sweden, presented in October Bolivia's first national urban policy — the Cities Policy . This strengthens the country's commitment to implementation of the New Urban Agenda.

The Cities Policy becomes the strategic instrument for guiding urban development in Bolivia. The Policy identifies and proposes actions to manage the challenges and opportunities of urbanization; it will be implemented at the city, territorial, and national levels.

The Policy uses a systemic approach towards achieving inclusive, healthy, sustainable, and resilient cities. UN-Habitat Bolivia relied on a participatory process to generate more than 250 events and workshops including 2 national urban forums, with the participation of over 7,000 representatives from a broad range of institutions and organizations.



The drafting and implementation of this policy marks a regional milestone and will contribute to the country's recovery following the socioeconomic crisis brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic. It will also help the country achieve its national development agenda as well as the Sustainable Development Goals.
